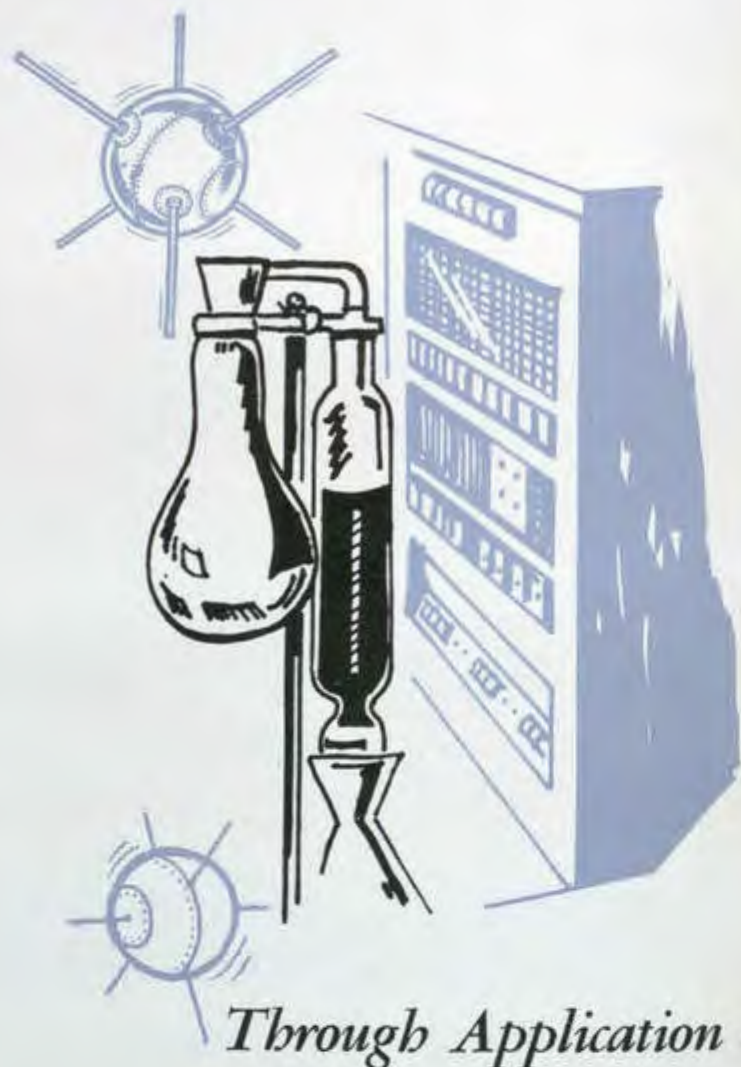

*Through Application of Established Techniques . . .*

The establishment of the various schools that comprise the University of Tennessee Medical Units at Memphis in 1911 was the culmination of the consolidation of most of the medical educational facilities in the state at that time. The eastern two-thirds of the state actually fostered most of the educational facilities now located in Memphis.

The College of Medicine had its foundations in four schools which culminated in a merger in Memphis in 1911. The College of Dentistry had its beginnings in Nashville in 1878. Later it consolidated with the Memphis College of Dental Surgery when the school moved to Memphis in 1911. The original School of Pharmacy was founded in Knoxville as part of the Chemistry Department, was moved to Nashville in 1909 and then in 1911 to Memphis. The School of Nursing actually started as the Memphis General

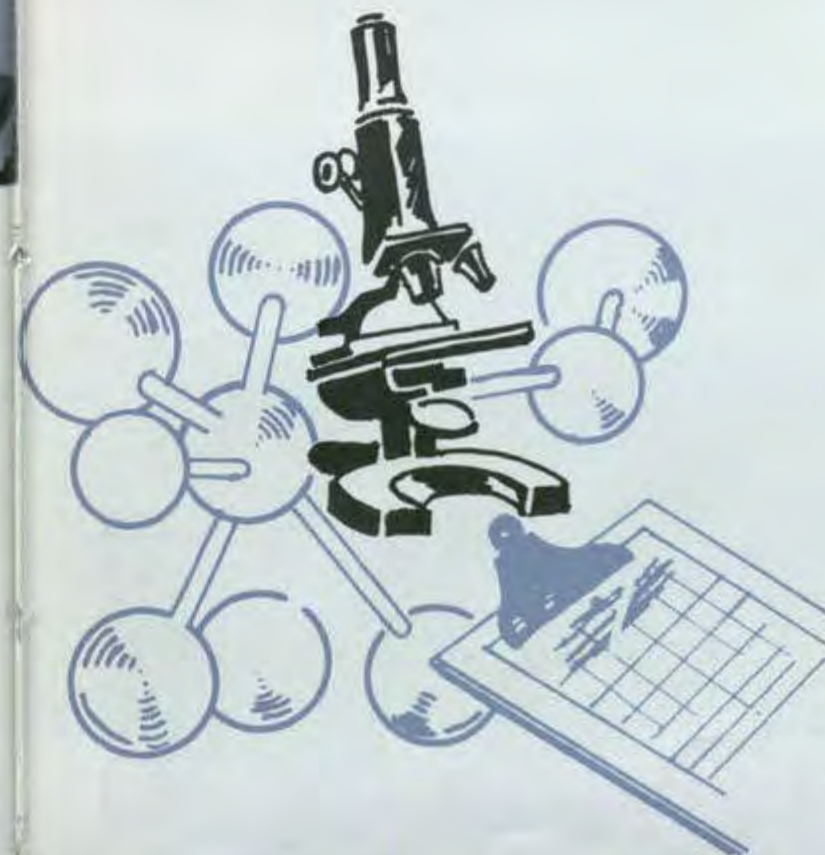

The many facets of education available to students at "U.T. in Memphis" include development of aca-



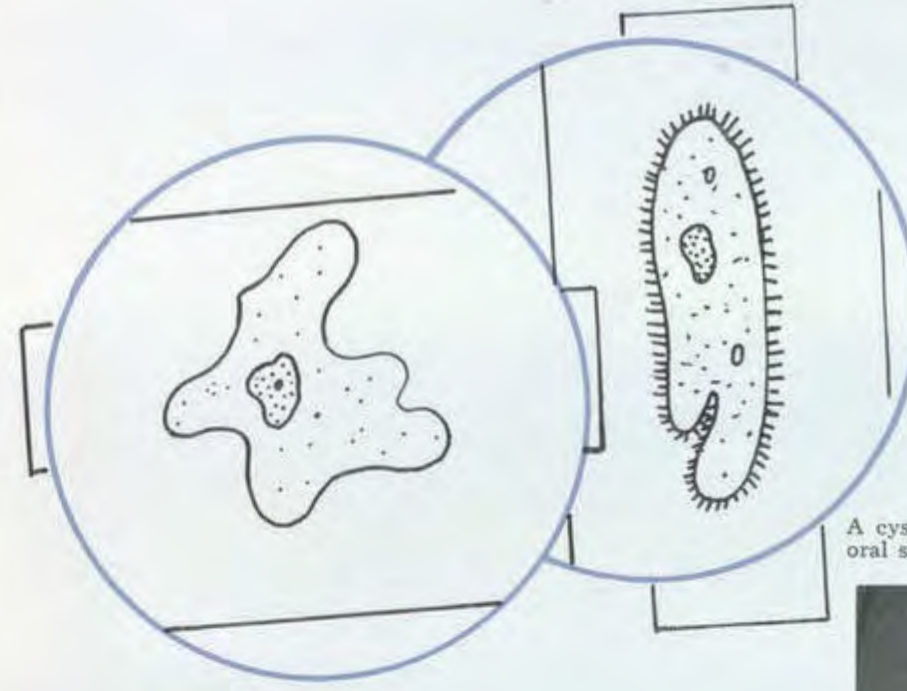

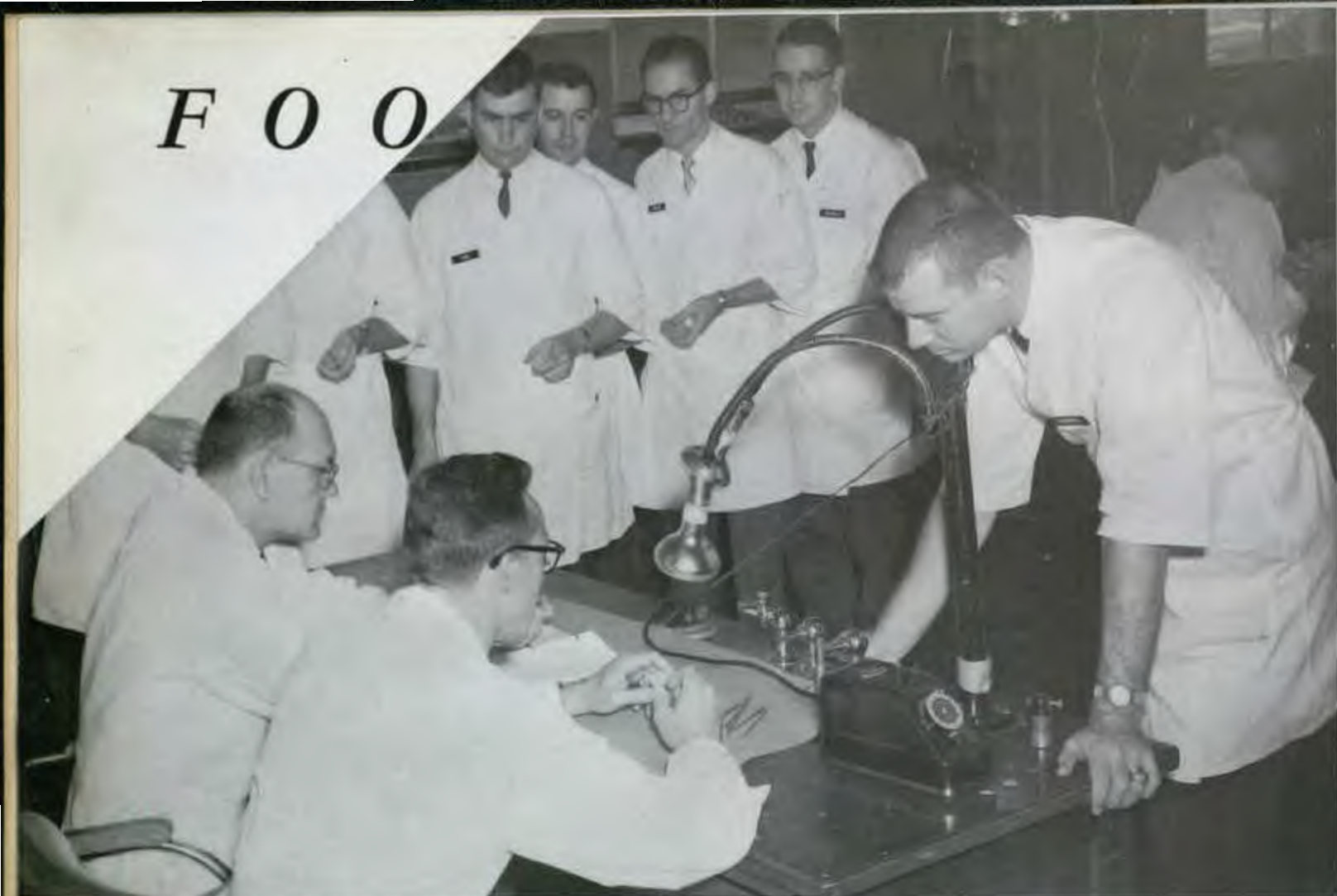

All students receive their basic instruction in the five departments of the School of Basic Medical Sciences. These five departments are Anatomy, Biochemistry, Pathology and Microbiology, Pharmacology and Physiology. It is this basic science foundation from which all of the allied medical professions derive basic principles and an understanding of the potential for future developments. This education in the basic sciences is paramount to the comprehension and application of future developments.

The Medical Units of the University of Tennessee and allied institutions also offer the opportunity for graduates to extend their education if more specialization is desired. Active programs in advanced research and specialized clinical training are available. The University of Tennessee recognizes its obligation to the medical professions and hosts frequent postgraduate training programs which serve to acquaint practitioners with recent advances in the allied medical fields.

### *In An Endeavor to Better Serve Mankind*

The practice of pediatric medicine presents new problems in the diagnosis and treatment of disease.



While maintaining a program for educating the future members of the medical professions, the Medical Units of the University of Tennessee is continuing to provide for the enlargement and improvement of available facilities. Recently the New West Tennessee Psychiatric Hospital and Research Building has been completed. Now under construction are the Dental-Pharmacy Research Building and a new Radiology Building which will be important additions. They will share with facilities presently operating in the medical center affording the citizens of the surrounding area with superior medical care, and affording students with the opportunity to learn through experience. More plans for expansion are under consideration to serve as a promise that the University will maintain its status as one of the great medical institutions of this age and will serve as an integral part of the Medical Professions' Future.

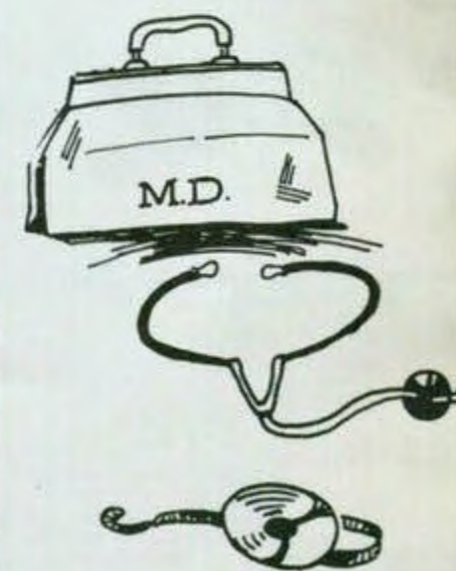

The College of Medicine, which is the oldest of the schools contained within the medical units, was founded in 1876 in Nashville. This department was transferred to Memphis in 1911 by order of the Board of Trustees following a merger with the Nashville Medical School in 1909. Subsequently the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Memphis and the Medical Department of Lincoln Memorial University of Knoxville were added to the University of Tennessee School of Medicine. From this humble beginning the University of Tennessee College of Medicine has continued to expand into one of the finest medical centers in the South, which furnishes students with an abundance of valuable clinical and pre-clinical experience.

The College of Medicine maintains a balanced curriculum of essential didactic lecture material and the application of principles developed from the combination of lectures and diligent study. The basic science program of fundamental essentials of health and disease is stressed in the pre-clinical years. Following proof of proficiency in the basic medical sciences, junior and senior students embark on the clinical years which are devoted to further instruction plus actual clinical experience. The facilities for clinical instruction include a comprehensive program of in-patient instruction obtained primarily within the University staffed hospitals, the diagnosis and treatment of out patients, and a home care program which enables students to experience the problems and rewards of the "family doctor."

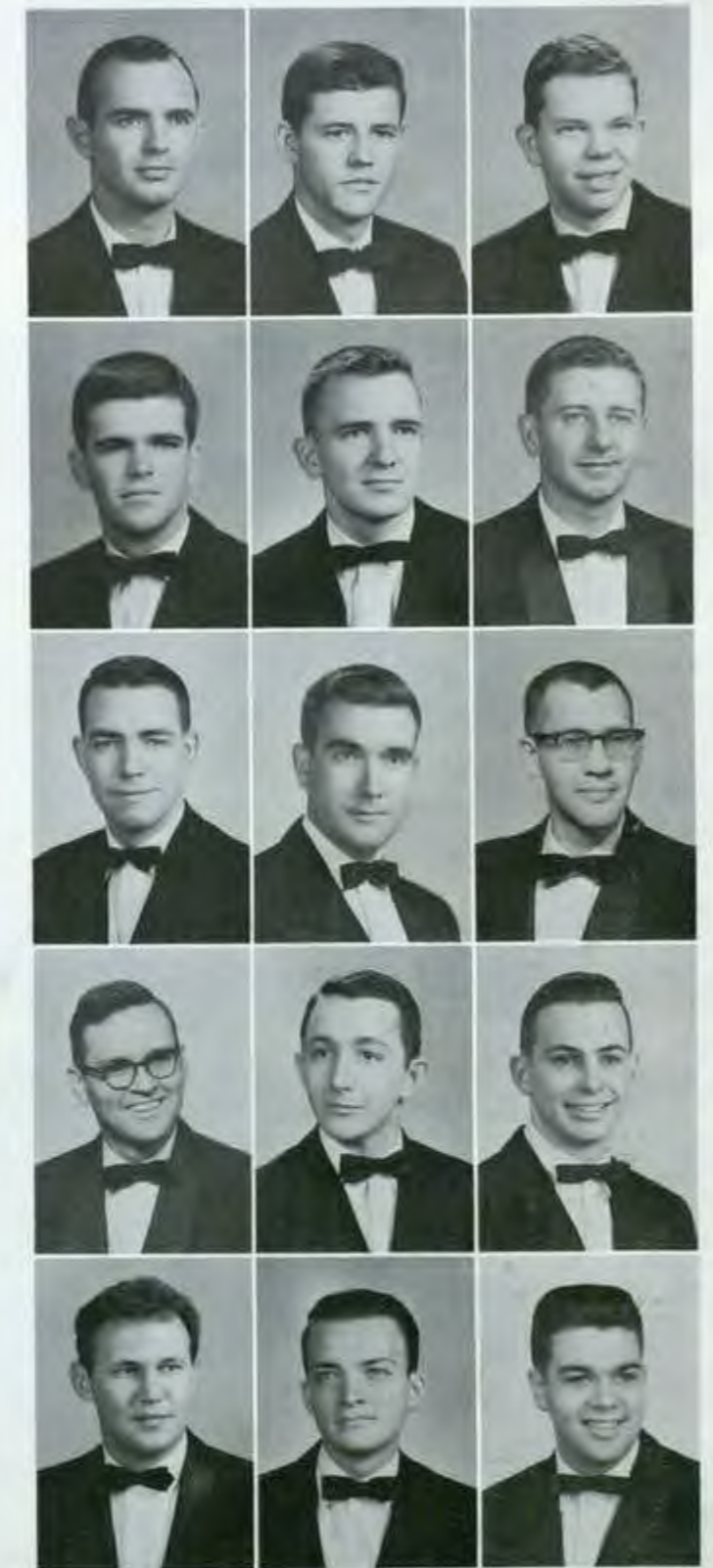

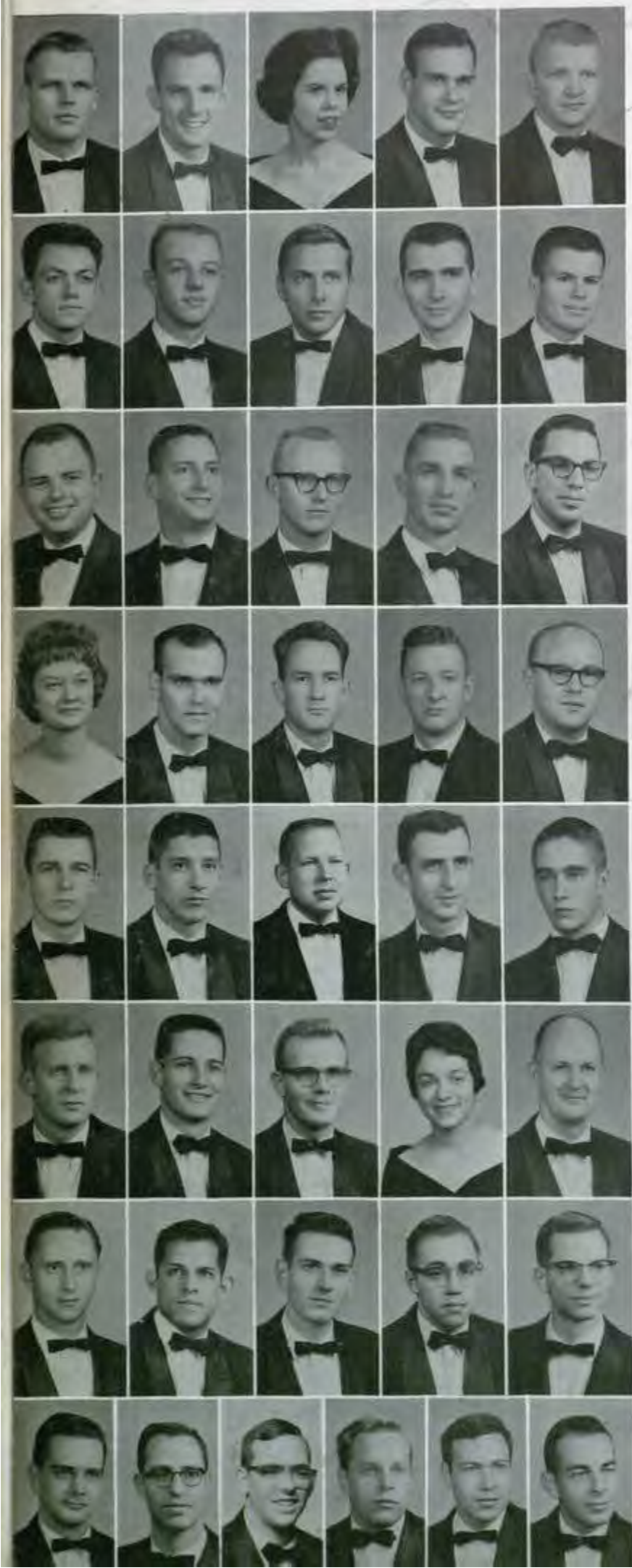

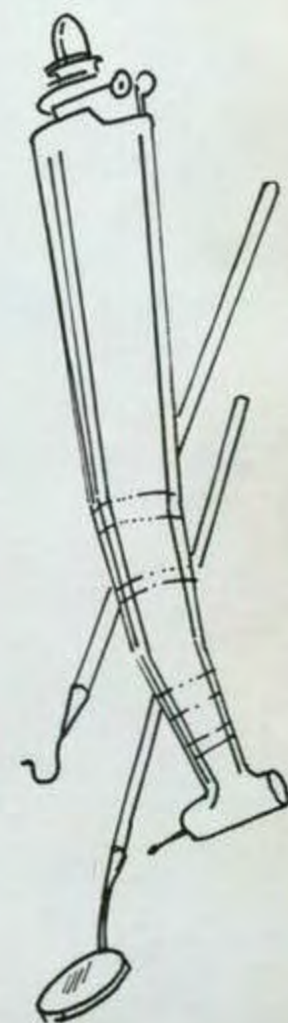

The College of Dentistry was founded in Nashville in 1878. The work of the College was moved from Nashville to Memphis in 1910 and became the University of Memphis College of Dental Surgery. In 1911 when the University of Tennessee moved its medical units to Memphis in order to secure larger facilities for the clinical work, the authorities of the University of Memphis transferred to the Board of Trustees of the University of Tennessee all of its equipment and the good will of its Dental Department. The College of Dentistry occupied the old Rogers Hall from 1919 to 1949. In 1949 the College moved to its modern building at 847 Monroe.

The College of Dentistry is organized into pre-clinical and clinical training. The freshman and sophomore courses are devoted largely to instruction in the basic biological sciences. Operative dentistry, complete denture technic; crown, bridge, and partial denture technic; prophylactic technic; orthodontics; radiology; anesthesiac and exodontia, are added to the preclinical with a view to preparing the student for the practical work on patients which begins with the junior course. During the junior course instruction special emphasis is placed on the more difficult operations in these various branches of dentistry. About half of the junior student's time is given to practical work upon the patient. In the senior course most of the work is devoted to practical application of the principles taught in preventive, curative and restorative dentistry. All of the practical work done in the junior and senior courses is under the supervision of experts in the various branches of dentistry.

The University of Tennessee College of Pharmacy had its beginning as a part of the University of Tennessee Department of Chemistry in Knoxville. The School of Pharmacy, as it was then titled, was moved to Nashville and again moved to Memphis and made part of the newly formed Medical Units in 1911. Since then the School of Pharmacy has become a fully accredited College of Pharmacy and ranks as one of the largest Colleges of Pharmacy in the United States. The College has progressed from being little more than a trade school where basic techniques were taught to a highly developed research minded institution.

Students entering the College of Pharmacy now must have six quarters of pre work in a liberal arts college. The first three quarters of pharmacy are devoted to learning of basic technique and the basic medical sciences. The beginning of the junior year signifies the beginning of the equivalent of clinical studies. Juniors and seniors take such advanced courses as dispensing, hospital pharmacy, manufacturing pharmacy, and pharmaceutical jurisprudence. For those wishing to enter into post graduate education senior elective courses such as radio-isotopes, parenteral products, and cosmetology are offered.

The University of Tennessee College of Pharmacy now has one of the largest faculties of any College of Pharmacy with twenty-five staff members holding fifty-seven degrees from twenty-eight different Universities. To improve its present facilities for student training the College is devoting large amounts of space in the new Dental-Pharmacy Research Building.

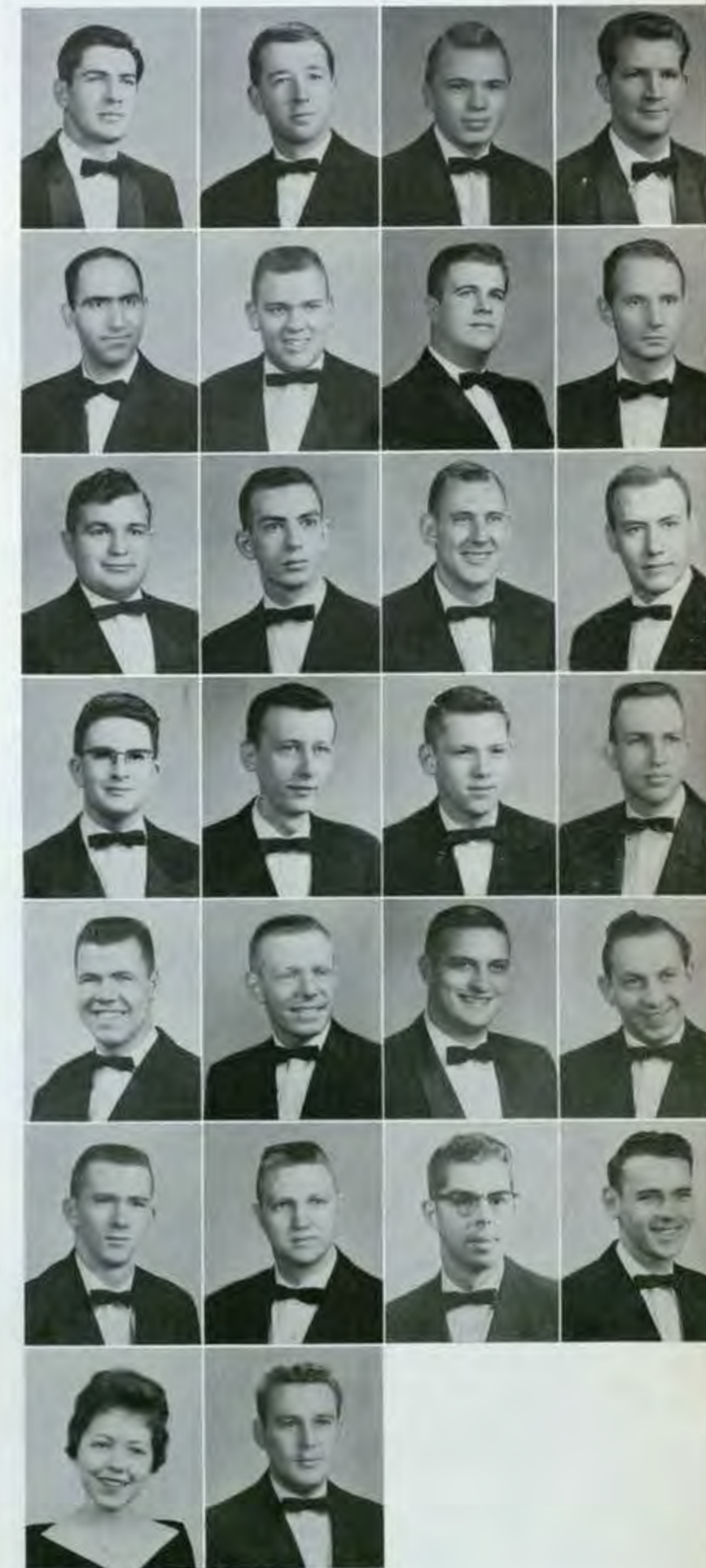

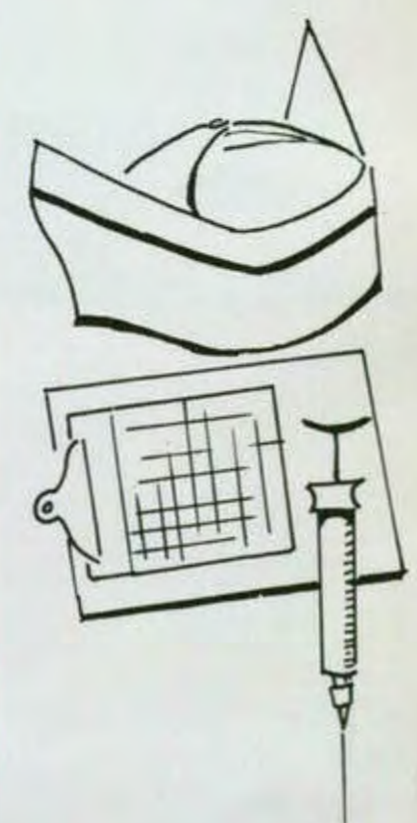

The School of Nursing had its origin in 1898 in the Training School of the Memphis General Hospital. In 1926 the University of Tennessee School of Nursing came into being through a contractual arrangement between the University and the Memphis General Hospital. The School became a self-governing unit within the University in 1949 and the program leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science in Nursing was established in 1950. In 1958 a program was inaugurated in which the students were required to spend one year in pre-nursing work in a liberal arts college. In 1961 the school became the College of Nursing. The College of Nursing is approved by the Tennessee Board of Nursing and has full National Accreditation for generic and general nursing programs.

From 1928 to 1960 graduate training in the basic medical sciences was an important objective of The School of Biological Sciences (now The School of Basic Medical Sciences). Operating under the regulations of The Graduate School, it successfully offered opportunities to young men and women to pursue careers as teacher-investigators in the fields of anatomy, biochemistry, pathology, microbiology, pharmacology, and physiology.

Graduate education and research training at The Medical Units has had a notable past: registration has about doubled each decade from 1932 to 1952 and is presently approaching 100. Some 90 advanced degrees have been awarded, twenty of these being Ph.D.'s. Dollar volume of support for research and research training in the basic sciences has risen from less than \$100,000 in 1942 to more than \$1,250,000 currently.

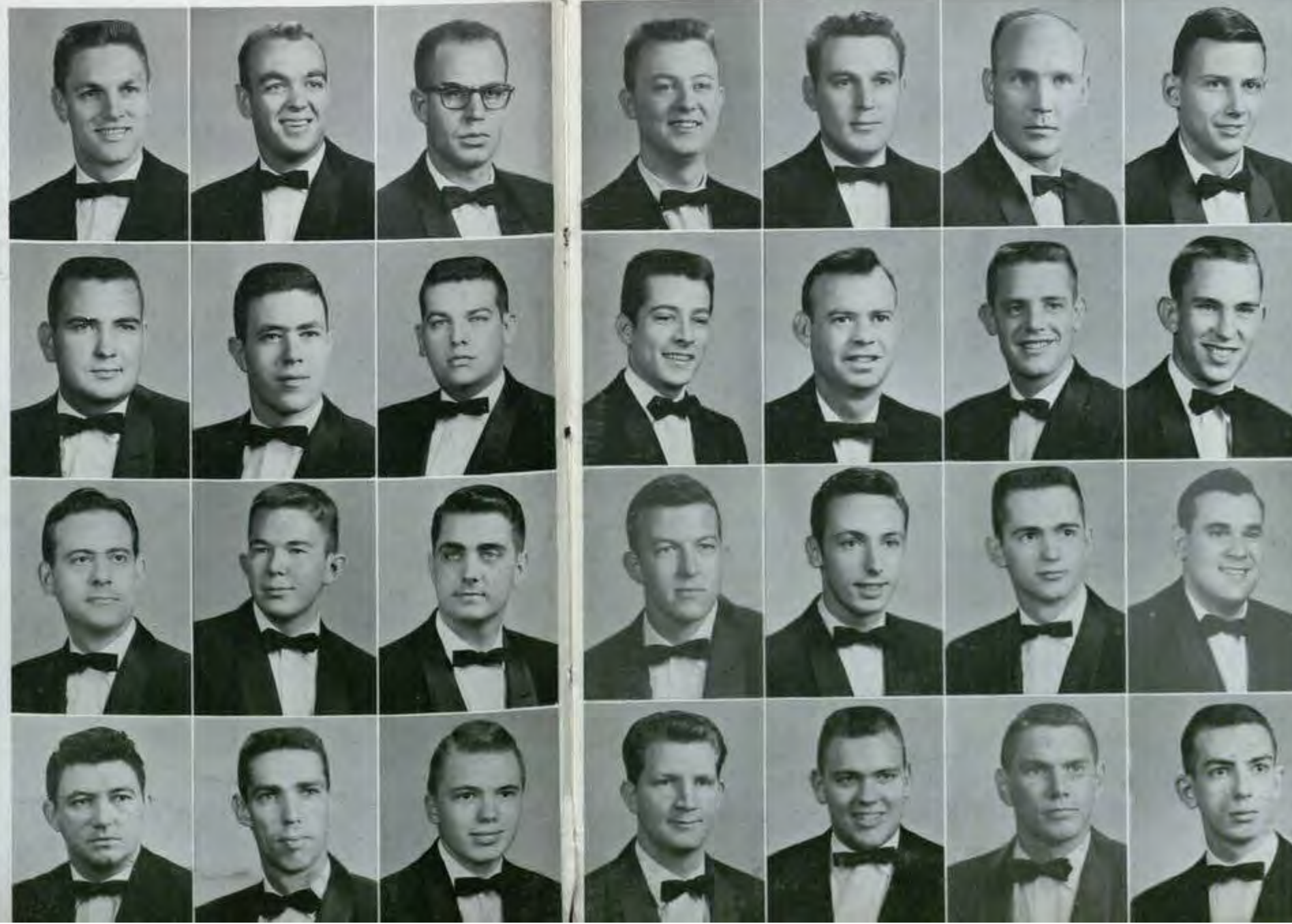

It is with great pride that we of Phi Delta Chi look at the past record of this fraternity. Scholarship has always played an important part in the life of this group.

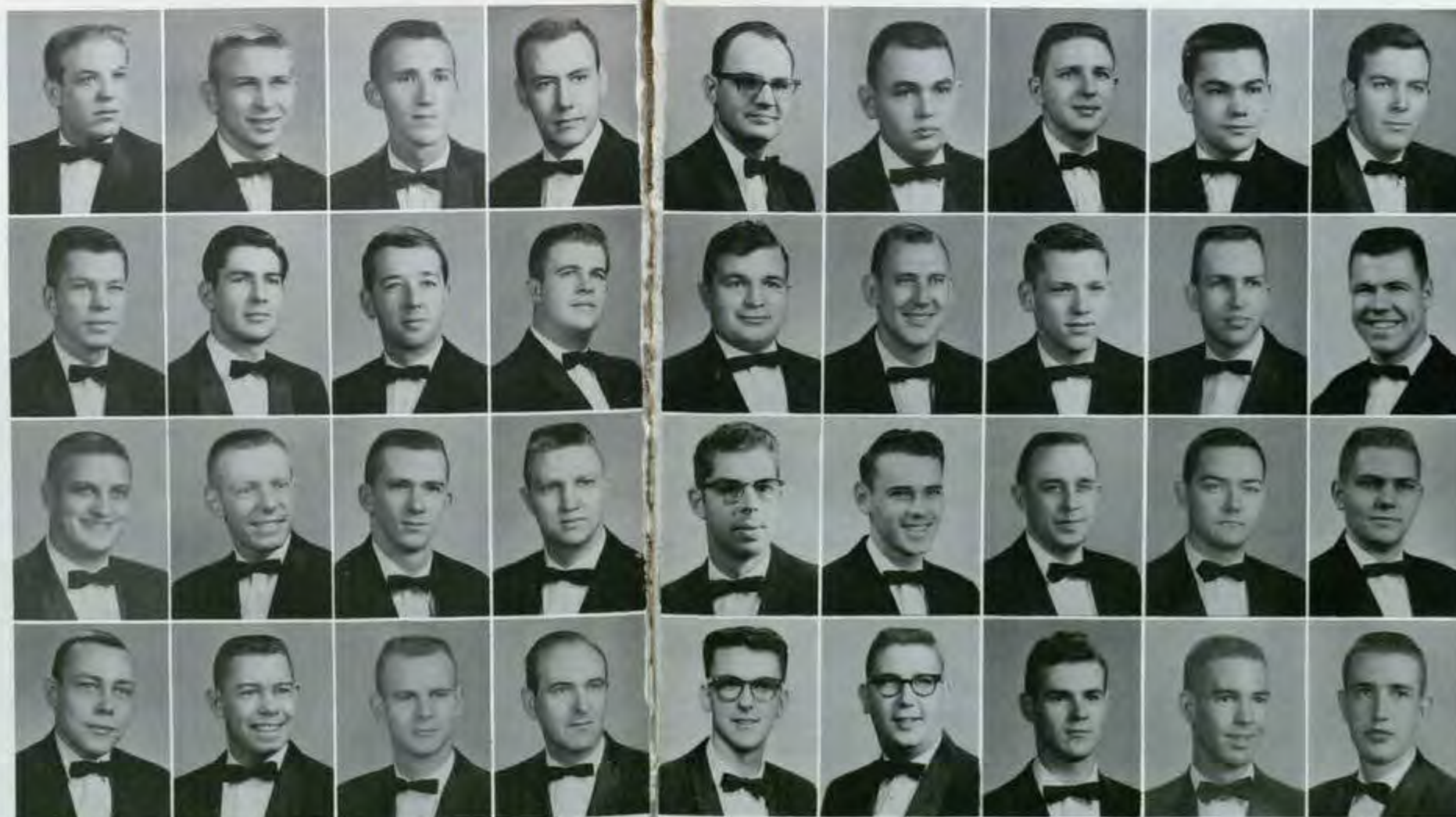

Omicron Kappa Upsilon is a society of dentists whose purpose is as stated in the preamble of the society's first constitution, "To encourage and develop a spirit of those who shall distinguish themselves by high grade of scholarship."

The society was organized in 1914 at Northwestern University Dental School. The official insignia adopted in 1915 embodies the spirit of the society. The insignia is a key with the letters, O (Omicron), K (Kappa), and U (Upsilon) by the Greek letter S (Sigma). The first three initials, which indicate the name of this society, are derived from three Greek words, Odontos (teeth), Kai (and), and Hygia (Health). The encircling letter S (Sigma) derives from the Greek word Soteria (conservation or preservation), and represents the all-embracing ideal of conservation which is the chief concern of the dental profession and its oral health service.

There are 46 chapters with approximately 9,500 members. Psi Chapter was founded May 15, 1929, and now has a membership of 114. Its charter members were R. S. Vinsant, R. D. Dean, C. P. Harris, J. F. Bigge, W. E. Lundy, L. J. McRae, J. J. Ogden, J. D. Towner, and W. J. Templeton.

Election to the society is not only a recognition of accomplishment as a student, but also an insignia of both promise and expectancy of leadership in dentistry after graduation.

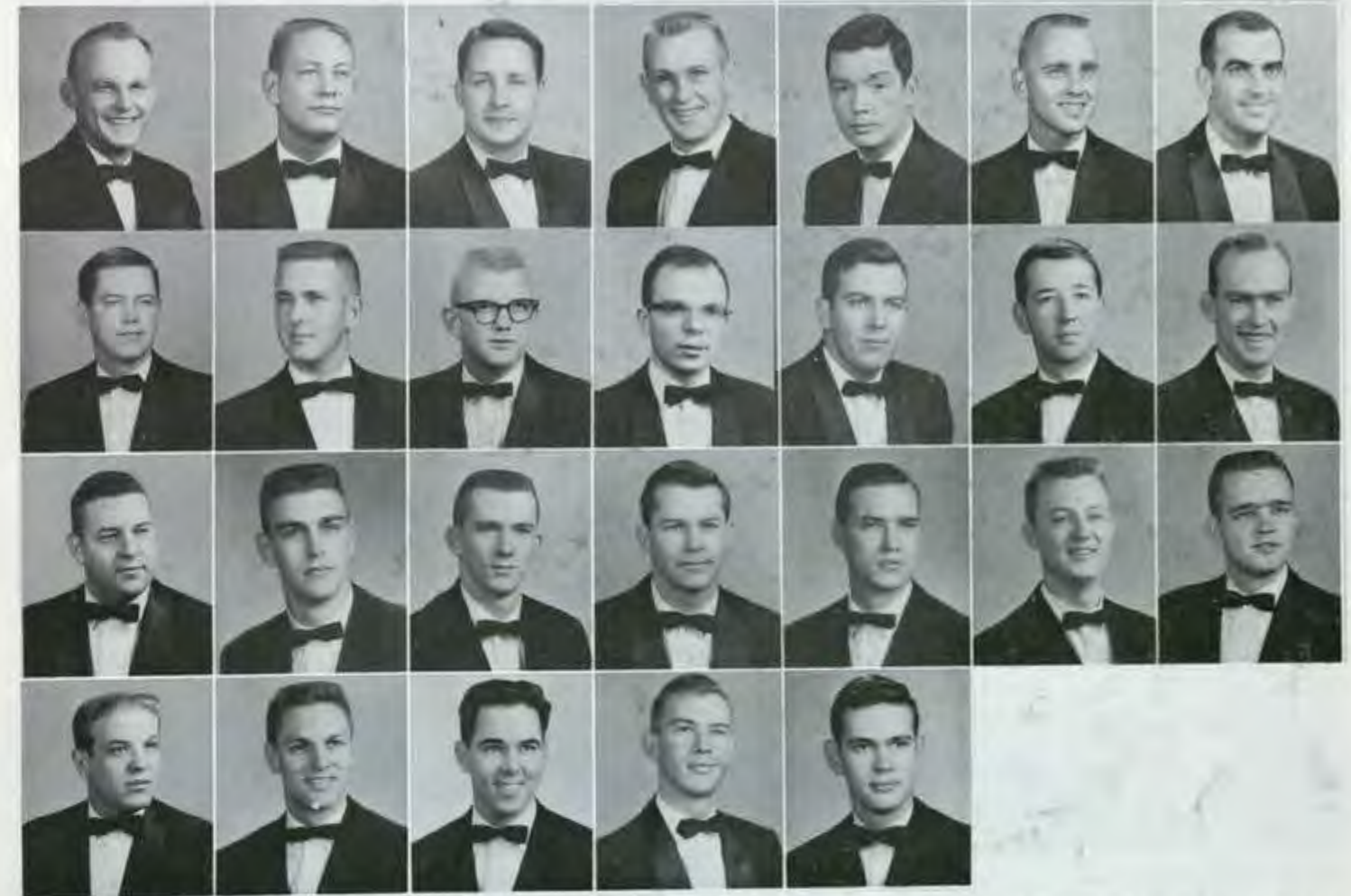

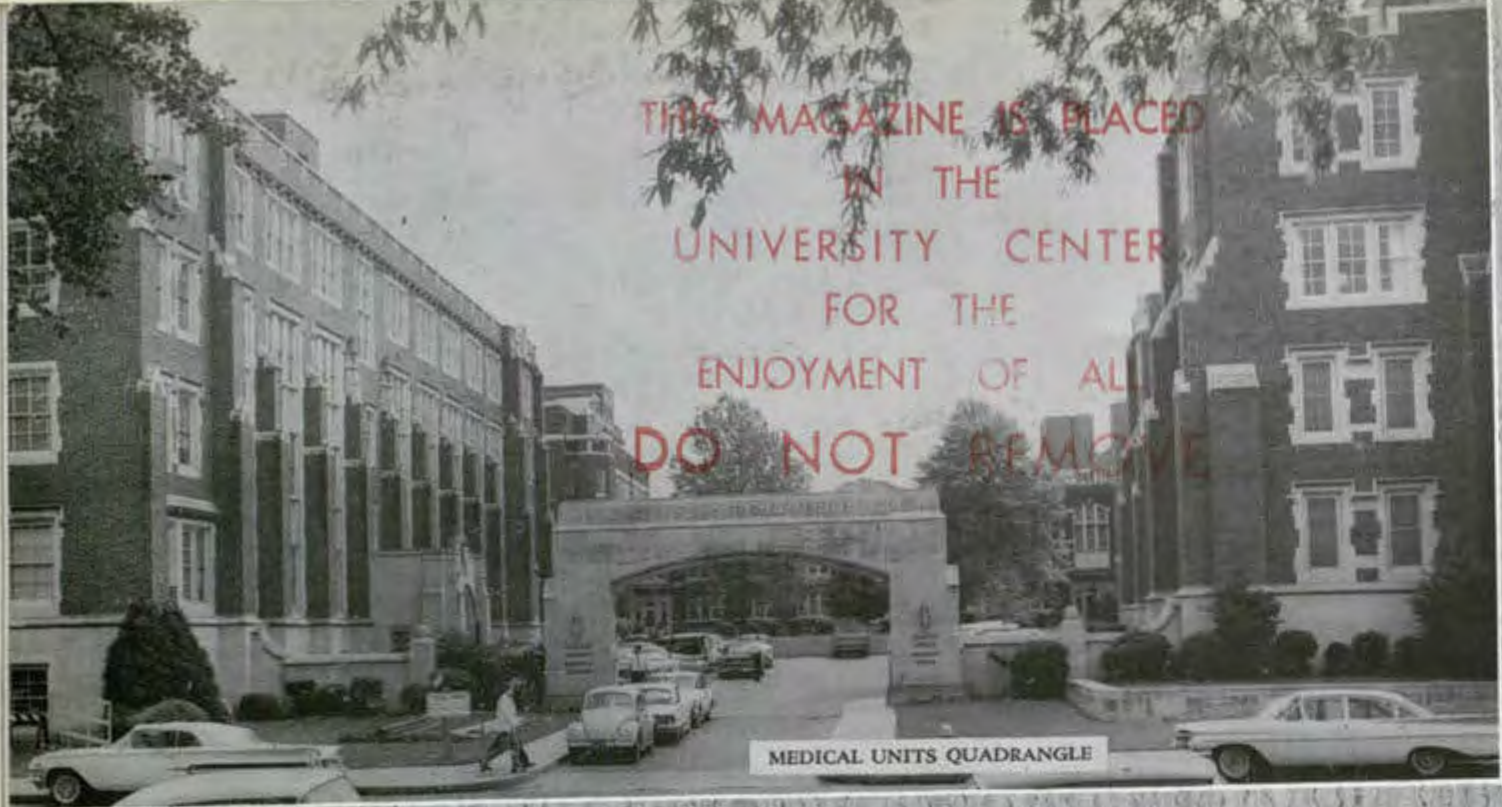
